Course Description:

Social and Developmental Psychology will illustrate the relationship between the developing individual and the society around them, with reference to both classical and contemporary theory. The course will explore how socio-cultural contexts influence development of self and identity throughout the lifespan, with particular focus on development from infancy to adolescence. The course will also discuss social psychological processes which influence interpersonal interaction in order to illustrate how these processes shape, and are shaped by, our social expectations, social roles and social goals. Students will have the opportunity to engage in independent research and academic writing on a topic related to the course material.

Prerequisites:

MSc Psychology (Conversion) students only

Aims and Objectives:

This course introduces students to a wide variety of social and developmental theory and research, which will provide students with knowledge of related contributions, implications and limitations. Related key concepts such as good research practice and research ethics will be discussed in relation to research findings covered in the course. Additionally, this course will demonstrate to the student how social and developmental research can be applied to

real life issues, such as prejudice and discrimination. Furthermore, the course aims to develop students' critical thinking skills in relation to research, as they will be given the opportunity to examine research methods used to understand social and developmental psychology.
