

ELECTRICAL APPLIANCE POLICY

Introduction

- This policy ensures the safe use of electrical appliances at the University in compliance
 with the Electricity at Work Regulations 1989 and the Provision and Use of Work
 Equipment Regulations 1998 (PUWER). This policy also aligns with the University's
 duties under the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974 and HSE's guidance on
 electrical safety in offices and educational settings.
- 2. It applies to all staff, students, contractors, and visitors using electrical equipment on University premises. The University generally does not allow the use of privately owned electrical equipment in office buildings. A guideline of appliances not permitted is provided below, the list may not be exhaustive but if you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact the estates & facilities department estates&facilities@richmond.ac.uk

Personal space heaters	Not permitted, however in extreme extenuating circumstances a University		
	supplied space heater may be issued.		

- 3. The use of **non-UK electrical chargers and adapters**, such as US or EU plugs with travel adapters, is **strictly prohibited** due to associated fire and electrical risks. If such equipment is found in use, the University reserves the right to temporarily confiscate it and return it when the user leaves the premises.
- 4. Where a compliant charger is needed, users should contact the **Estates & Facilities Department**, who may be able to provide a suitable loan device.

Safety Responsibilities and Risk Management

5. The University is committed to managing all electrical systems and equipment under its control in line with the **Electricity at Work Regulations 1989**, ensuring risks are reduced to a level that is as low as reasonably practicable. The University will implement the following control measures:



- 5.1 All University-provided electrical systems and equipment must be suitable for their intended use and maintained in a safe condition.
- 5.2 Appropriate precautions must be taken to prevent harm or injury resulting from the use of electrical systems.
- 5.3 All electrical installations and appliances will be subject to a **risk-based programme of inspection, testing, and maintenance**, including **Portable Appliance Testing (PAT)** and **fixed installation testing** as appropriate.
- 5.4 All electrical systems and appliances will include a clearly accessible method of isolation and emergency shut-off.
- 5.5 Electrical equipment that is no longer in use, is unsafe, or has been decommissioned must be made safe and fully isolated from all sources of power.
- 5.6 Policy will be reviewed annually or in response to legal or operational changes.
- 5.7 Risk Management: Contractors must ensure all electrical equipment brought on site is PAT-tested and compliant with University requirements.
- 5.8 High-risk works such as repairs to fixed installations or temporary power setups must be controlled using a permit-to-work system issued by Estates & Facilities.
- 5.9 All staff and contractors will receive induction training that includes electrical safety and policy awareness.

Compliance

6. All members of the University community are obliged to comply with this policy in line with their staff contract or the Student Code of Conduct. Persistent non-compliance may result in disciplinary action under staff or student conduct procedures."
