Course Description:

This course introduces the fundamental principles of painting. Students explore hands-on approaches to paint application, colour and composition through a number of set projects that result in the making of a final painted work. There is emphasis placed on the relationship between drawing and painting and a sketchbook is used to encourage and develop this. The course also includes one museum visit as part of the aim to contextualize the work produced in class within a broader context.

A studio fee is levied on this course.

Prerequisites: None

Aims and Objectives:

This course aims to provide students with the skills and confidence to express themselves, in basic ways, through the medium of paint. The course also serves to provide understanding and

insight into the range of possibilities within the tradition of Western painting. Students are introduced to critical and analytical methods of evaluating both their own work and that of others.

Indicative Content:

- Basic colour theory and the way in which colours affect one another
- Use of tools to apply paint with control and intention
- General introduction to Western painting
- Analytical and critical approaches to reading visual imagery
- Research of source and reference material to aid creativity

Teaching Methodology:

Course material is presented through demonstrations, discussions and visual presentations, including a museum/gallery visit. Critique of the work produced takes the form of group discussion and individual tutorials.
