Course Description:

This course introduces students to monoprinting, relief printing and drypoint. The relationship between ideas generation and the printmaking process is central, enabling images to be explored experimentally and sequentially while establishing sound basic techniques in printmaking processes. Drawing, photography and digital media play an important role as means for research and information gathering both visual and as text. A studio fee is levied on this course.

Prerequisites: None

Aims and Objectives:

The course aims to encourage experimentation and ideas development, leading to personal outcomes within the printmaking discipline, techniques and processes.

Act largely under direction and supervision to produce prints using a range of printmaking processes.

Undertake research tasks to inform development of own printmaking work.

Learning outcome 4

Relate principles and concepts to underlying theoretical frameworks in the making of colour prints.

Indicative Content:

- Printmaking terminology and processes.
- Key characteristics of printmaking
- Historical and contemporary examples.
- Frottage.
- Monoprinting and indirect drawing.
- Colour separation and overprinting.
- Relief printing. Two stage reduction linocut, image interpretation.
- Registration.
- Intaglio/drypoint, image interpretation.
- Combination of two or more processes through personal interpretation.
- Use of equipment.

Assessment:

Teaching Methodology:

Course material is presented through demonstrations, discussions and lectures. Critique of work produced takes the form of group and individual discussion.

Work Requirements

In addition to the four practical elements of the course work: monoprint, relief-print, drypoint and personal interpretation, students will engage in a research project which leads to the production of a written paper. Students are expected to keep a notebook / journal which will be assessed along with the practical submissions.
