Course Description:

Changing Stages: Landmarks in Theatre is a course which seeks to introduce students to some major milestones of Western Drama from the Greeks through to the present day. Dramatic readings of play texts, films and theatre visits will be used to explore the impact these plays have had on the culture of their own time and how they impact on our consciousness today. No piece of theatre is 'dead'; it is a vibrant, exciting and engaging experience which speaks to its audience with a thundering clarity.

Aims and Objectives:

- To introduce students to some of the greatest plays in the canon of Western drama
- To provide students with specific historical, social and cultural perspectives in which to critically assess the impact and importance of theatre in different time periods from the Greeks to the English Renaissance and the Romantic movement, into the twentieth century
- To help students explore how theatre impacts on a live audience and what the immediacy of the performance means
- To facilitate student exploration of theatre in London and provide them with the necessary skills to evaluate a variety of plays

• To introduce students to the means by which they can monitor, build and reflect upon their personal development.
