Course Description:

How we read and approach a text is part of the pleasure of studying literature and contemporary culture. This course introduces students to key critical concepts and theories and how they can be applied to specific literary and media texts across cultures and historical periods. Students will acquire a variety of theoretical tools that will help them analyse texts and gain a deeper appreciation of the relationship between creative writing and critical writing.

- To be able to apply this knowledge to different literary genres and other media texts across cultures

 To be able to recognize the usefulness of critical and theoretical tools and their relationship to the appreciation of creative writing
