Course Description:

ITALIAN STUDY CENTRES ONLY. This course is designed to give students a deeper understanding of the role of drawing as an investigative process as well as an expressive means of communication. Drawing is used as a basic exploratory tool to examine Rome as the site for both subject – in particular, the river Tevere - and as a research resource for the practice of drawing - especially in the Roman Churches, Galleries and Museums. The course is divided between working in the studio and on location in Rome. The sketchbook is an essential aspect of the course in helping students to document the city, stimulate and develop ideas and as a reminder that drawing is a portable medium. *A studio fee is levied on this course*

Prerequisites: *ADM 3800 Drawing I* An introductory Drawing class.

Aims and Objectives:

The main aim of this course is to engage students in the act of drawing as a means of extending their response to - and understanding of - the world. The course is based on two contrasting but complementary approaches: the first entails closer examination of the built environment through drawing from observation and the second involves the study of drawings held in study collections within the city. The student's Final Portfolio is intended to be a personal, visual memoir of their semester in Rome.

Programme Outcomes:

This is a standalone course that is not associated with a degree programme.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, successful students should be able to:

- Show a range of drawing approaches, both technically and conceptually, in responding to, and recording the world around them.
- Create a two dimensional composition of a chosen subject (still-life, landscape, figure and/or abstract).
- Express an idea/concept/feeling through drawing in a personal style, incl. mark making, use of light and dark.
- Analyse and develop drawing as a tool to articulate the experience of a city.

Indicative Content:

- Site visits
- Range of drawing techniques developed
- Copy of drawings by Renaissance and Baroque masters
- Human anatomy: skeleton or wax sculpture;
- Various sculptures by ancient Greek and Roman artists
- A selected object in the Musei Capitolini
- Architecture: Piazza Navona, the Pantheon, Ponte Sant'Angelo, Piazza san Pietro, Sant'Ivo alla Sapienza
- Gardens: *Gianicolo, Villa Borghese*
- Editing of Sketchbook of Rome

Assessment:

Teaching Methodology:

This class is delivered through presentation in practical workshops/demonstrations, group discussions and tutorials. The majority of the classes are held outside of the studio. Studio work includes group reviews, discussions, drawings developed from the sketchbooks and others based on memory.
