Course Description: This course concentrates on consolidating and developing journalistic reporting and writing skills. Particular attention is given to the teaching of advanced reporting skills (such as covering major incidents, public affairs and the courts), and to specialist reporting in areas such as the environment, consumer affairs and health. The emphasis of the course is on developing independent reporting skills so that by the end of the course students can plan, research and write a longer feature on an issue of public concern.

Prerequisites: JRN 4200 and JRN 5200

Aims and Objectives:

This course will help students to develop advanced reporting techniques and to appreciate the role and ethical challenges of the communications professional. At the end of the course successful students should have:

- A detailed understanding of different reporting techniques and of when to apply them to specific situations.
- A detailed understanding of advanced research skills including computerassisted research, the effective use of public records and databases, the Freedom of Information Act, and other complex information.

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• The ability to use different reporting techniques

- The ability to apply ethical and legal standards to their writing and reporting
- The ability to conduct their own researching with minimum supervision
