## **Course Description:**

This course introduces students to journalism, its origins, principles and practices, and the enduring debates around its relationship to society. Recurring themes such as freedom of the press, professional 'objectivity', technological innovation and economic sustainability will be put into historical context. Watershed moments in specialist areas from investigative journalism to war reporting are explored, as well as the rise of participatory journalism and the so-called 'dumbing down' of journalism.

## Aims and Objectives:

- To provide an introduction to the development of professional journalism, putting its practices and principles in historical context.
- To gain an appreciation of the crucial role technology and economics have played the development of journalism.
- To critically engage with journalism discourses as they relate to society and power.

- To explore the new digital multimedia practice of journalism and its outcomes.
- To use a range of sources (academic books and journals, news articles, and the Internet) and to engage with journalistic texts.
