Course Description:

ITALIAN STUDY CENTRES ONLY. This course is designed to provide students with the opportunity to explore the relationship between psychology and culture by examining the theoretical and methodological issues in cross-cultural psychology. This course aims to provide students with the tools to critically evaluate traditional psychological research and theories in key areas of psychology from a cross-cultural perspective. Students will be expected to question which traditional models and theories may be universally applied. Students are encouraged to develop an understanding of ethnocentrism and the extent to which this contributes to the 'lenses' worn by psychologists when conducting research and developing theories. The topics covered will include the effect of culture on mental health, gender, psychological disorders.

PSY 3100 Foundation of Psychology

Aims and Objectives:

- a) To provide students with knowledge with a variety of orientations to understanding culture
- b) To provide students with knowledge of the cross-cultural approach to research
- c) To familiarize students with the constructs of emic and etic principles.

- d) To enable students to evaluate cross-cultural research findings with respect to both methodology and explanatory power
- e) To allow students to develop a critical and culturally aware approach to the evaluation and application of research findings in cross-cultural psychology.
