#### **Course Description:**

In 2011, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that antidepressant use in the United States has increased nearly 400% in the last two decades, making antidepressants the most frequently-used class of medications by Americans aged 18-44 years. In a similar manner, a study conducted between 2001-2003 by the National Institute of Mental Health reported that, at some point in their lives, 46% of Americans met the criteria established by the American Psychiatric Association for at least one mental illness. This course will explore how modern Clinical Psychology implements evidence-based treatments to improve psychologically-based distress or dysfunction and promote subjective and behavioural well-being and personal development.

**Prerequisites:** PSY 5200 and PSY5405

Aims and Objectives: This course is designed develop students' understanding of the theory and practice of clinical psychology and serve as an introduction to an applied field of psychology. Lectures will introduce topics in clinical psychology such as current trends and interests in clinical psychology; how evidence-based treatments are conducted and implemented; low-intensity cognitive behavioural treatments for anxiety and depression; psychological disorders in adult; ageing disorders; learning difficulties and; neuropsychological assessment and rehabilitation. Students are

expected to develop a sound understanding of clinical psychology interventions strengths and limitations. Professional issues including the ethics of clinical practice will also be addressed.
