Course Description:

ITALIAN STUDY CENTRES ONLY. This course examines developments in early Italian painting and sculpture leading up to the Renaissance and Baroque. Students consider early Italian art from the Etruscans and Romans up to the Renaissance, in art historical context, particularly in terms of patronage and the key social, religious and philosophical events. It is normally taught during field study visits, which include Lucca, Pisa, Venice, and Rome. A field project paper is normally required.

Aims and Objectives:

- To introduce students to early Italian painting and sculpture leading up to the Renaissance and Baroque
- To consider early Italian art in its art historical context
- To examine early Italian art in relation to patronage and key social, religious and philosophical events
- To consider early Italian art in context, normally in situ in Lucca, Pisa, Venice and Rome

Indicative Content:

Normally, on site lectures in Lucca, Pisa, Venice and Rome Lucca:

- Etruscan and Roman influences
- Religious architecture
- Medieval architecture

Pisa:

- The maritime republic, conflicts with Lucca and Florence
- Classical Roman art with oriental influences
- Sculptural decoration

Venice:

• From the Basilica di S. Marco and the Palazzo Ducale to the Guggenheim Museum

Rome:

From the Colliseum to Michelangelo to the Tivoli gardens

Teaching Methodology:

Classes normally take the form of presentations by the lecturer on-site. In the museum and gallery situation, students will be divided into small groups and directed in close visual analysis and discussion. On occasion, they will be asked to self-conduct their museum visit with the help of an ad hoc worksheet. It should be noted that discussion will comprise a major element of this course and all students are expected to verbalize their thoughts and perceptions and to develop a critical response to the material under consideration. They must keep up with assignments, be prepared to ask questions, and discuss their readings.
