### **Course Description:**

ITALIAN STUDY CENTRES ONLY. This is an introductory course to Italian language, with an integrated approach to the Italian language and culture. The course teaches essential vocabulary and grammar, developing students' ability to communicate in an authentic linguistic context – key to making the most of the experience of their stay in Italy. The course introduces cultural and linguistic knowledge associated with the use of the language.

# Aims and Objectives:

In accordance with the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR) for Languages of the Council of Europe level A1/A2, this course aims to:

- develop students' ability to use phrases and high frequency vocabulary related to areas of immediate personal relevance;
- enable students to read and understand very short, simple texts taken from everyday material, such as advertisements, menus and timetables;
- acquire basic grammar structures through the analysis of sentences in context;
- give students the necessary skills to carry out routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar topics and activities;
- give students the ability to write short, comprehensible notes and messages and simple, personal letters;
- develop awareness and analytical knowledge of the basic language structures and of cultural differences and similarities concerning intercultural communications. Students should be able to communicate with a good awareness of cultural differences in the use of the language, integrating the learning of fundamental language structures and vocabulary with an understanding on how the language is related to Italian culture.
- It encourages students to develop their own language learning strategies so as to be able to conduct basic communication functions confidently in a limited range of topics concerning daily life situations.

# **Learning Outcomes:**

- acquire an awareness and analytical knowledge of language based cultural differences and similarities concerning intercultural communications.

#### **Indicative Content:**

Expanding basic grammar and vocabulary in context

#### Receptive skills:

- Understanding simple conversations at regular speed
- Understanding uncomplicated statements
- Expanding on basic reading comprehension

#### Oral communication skills:

• Exposure to authentic materials, both audio and visual, encouraging oral interaction with the use of the language and its cultural context.

#### Communicative functions:

- Using the present and the past tense in conversation
- Using acquired grammar and vocabulary in context
- Thematic and practical activities which require the students to interact with each other with the language, also encouraging team work.

### Written skills:

- Writing short reports
- Describing past events, using appropriate grammar and vocabulary
- Use of authentic text materials for the written communication to contextualize the language and its cultural background.

### **Teaching Methodology:**

Classes are conducted mainly in Italian and take a functional approach to language learning. Students are not expected to understand every word but to attempt to grasp the key points and the overall meaning. Participation based on task oriented exercises in various forms (e.g. pair work, group work, discussion, role play and presentation) is encouraged to maximise interactive communications. The instructor not only guides and corrects, but also challenges students to immerse themselves in the linguistic and cultural experience. Guided language exchange with locals are aimed at developing independent intercultural and interpersonal communication skills both in comprehension and language production. Feedback is provided in a timely manner to facilitate the learning.

### **Independent learning**

Students are expected to spend the same amount of time of class hours both studying and practicing outside the class. Guidance and resources are provided to facilitate their learning and to help them develop their confidence and skills as an independent language learner. Homework and practical on-site assignments should consolidate the learning of Italian vocabulary and structures, help students develop personal learning strategies for effective communication and stimulate reflection on cultural differences.
