Course Description:

This course enables students to produce their own book. The approach is focused on the book as an art object and students will explore the wide range of creative possibilities for book making as a serious form of personal expression and visual communication. Students will bring their own particular area of interest/specialism or they may develop an interdisciplinary approach. An integral component of this course is the study of the history of artists' books and students will actively engage with the key resource centres at The National Art Library in The Victoria and Albert Museum, The British Library and The Tate Library. *Prerequisite: Junior Status or with permission of course tutor. A studio fee is levied on this course.*

Prerequisites: ARW 4195

Aims and Objectives:

The primary aim of this course is to encourage and enable students to take a creative idea or set of ideas and develop, create and organise them effectively and in a structured fashion to produce an artist's book. An important secondary aim is to give a greater understanding of the way in which the range of approaches that artists have adopted in the making of artists' books reflect cultural and contextual differences and students therefore examine the relatively recent history of the form.

Teaching Methodology:

This course will be taught in the studio and workshops at Kensington but will also include classes held in museums. In the practical classes workshop demonstrations will take place and students will have a hands-on approach to making and learning. Individual and group tutorials are help to facilitate the writing of the research paper.
