#### **Course Description:**

This course introduces students to a wide range of twentieth- and twenty-firstcentury short stories predominantly from Europe and America. It provides a critical framework for the understanding and analysis of short fiction, and introduces students to key authors and themes of the form. The approach is through creative writing practice: classes incorporate a writer's workshop, in which students explore the short story form in detail, through reading and writing, and students are encouraged to read as writers. Students regularly submit their work-in-progress for critical consideration by the instructor and other members of the class.

Prerequisites: CRW 3200 Writing From the Creative Impulse or ARW 4195

#### Aims and Objectives:

• To become active and perceptive readers of the multifaceted nature of short story writing

- To critically engage with key authors, concepts, styles and themes of the short story
- To apply a variety of storytelling techniques to the creative process of writing
- To develop the necessary analytical skills involved in the writing process, including regular self-assessment, revision, group work and feedback reflection

## **Teaching Methodology:**

Course meetings consist of interactive lectures and close readings of assigned stories, small group discussions and reflection activities. Students engage in weekly writing exercises and then shape their work outside of class, submitting it the following week for peer and instructor review. Students work towards developing a portfolio of short stories. Student work is assessed through a variety of ways using both formative and summative approaches.
