Course Description:

Introduces students to the process of research, including the ability to work from libraries, exhibitions and institutional archives, and developing skills in visual literacy and academic writing. Students are encouraged to develop independence of thought by discovering, evaluating and making appropriate use of a wide range of approaches to research and writing. Complementing the courses on theory, this course assists students with the identification of their own interests as they move towards choosing a thesis or professional research project.

Aims and Objectives:

- To introduce students to the process of conducting MA level autonomous research
- To enable students to develop their visual literacy including sustained formal analysis
- To engage critically with texts and objects
- To consider the qualities of academic writing including effective arguments supported by evidence
- To examine and apply professional presentation skills

- show systematic, critical engagement with texts and objects
- conduct successful and original research, including the application of appropriate methodologies for locating, assessing and interpreting primary sources
- show excellent writing skills including logical and structured narratives and arguments supported by relevant primary and secondary evidence
- demonstrate professional presentation skills including verbal visual analysis, communicated clearly to specialist and non-specialist audiences

Indicative Content:

- methods for conducting library and archival research
- methods for engaging critically with texts
- methods for engaging critically with objects
- visual literacy including formal analysis
- writing skills including logical and structured narratives and arguments supported by relevant primary and secondary evidence
- presentation skills including verbal visual analysis

Teaching Methodology:

Teaching will include interactive lectures, supplemented with a range of audiovisual aids, designed to introduce students to the key concepts of professional practice. Guest speakers and activities will contribute alternative perspectives and experience. Students will develop their critical understanding of these concepts and their practical application through a range of workshops and group and individual exercises undertaken in class and out of class. Their group and individual presentations and written work will be discussed in feedback sessions which explore responses to issues arising from professional practice. The teaching will be supplemented with individual tutorials designed to address students' personal needs.
