### **Course Description:**

This course examines the importance of finance within professional sports. It grounds students in the 'real world' of financial management in sport, illustrating how to apply financial concepts and appreciate the importance of finance in sound sport management and operations, and distinguishes the skills and principles of finance from those of economics

SPT 5215 Sports Management

### **Aims and Objectives:**

- To develop a full understanding of the fundamental principles of sport finance
- To be able to apply the techniques of financial analysis to decision-making in sports
- To understand the financial pressures to which sports are subject, and how sport organizations can respond to changes in operational circumstances

**Teaching Methodology:**

The course is taught primarily via a series of interactive lectures, based on a rigorous set of readings to be discussed in each session. Students will be expected to participate fully in discussions, both in-class and online. Whenever possible, readings will be available online via Blackboard. Additionally, students will regularly receive various e-newsletters via e-mail. The nature of the course means that students will be required to participate regularly during in-class calculations, requiring the use of a decent financial calculator.
