### **Course Description:**

This course is designed to introduce the students to the key concepts of narrative photography and support students in developing visual skills and conceptual strategies. Students will be required to develop their understanding of, and ability to deconstruct photographs within a narrative context and then apply this understanding within their own work. The course will introduce students to analogue technologies and build upon their digital practices. Students provide their own film.

### **Prerequisites:**

None

### **Aims and Objectives:**

The course is designed for the student to learn and acquire a strong basis in image making. The course engages in historical, theoretical, and contemporary debate and explore how narrative is conceived, formulated and read within the narrative photography. This course will introduce and encourage students to experimental photographic practices exploring different processes from film photography to working digitally, and output in a range of formats to push the boundaries of photographic narrative.
