Course Description:

This course surveys the history of London from its Roman origins to the modern cosmopolitan metropolis that it is today. Through a variety of themes, students will explore social, political and architectural developments of this urban centre throughout the ages. Students will both read about and visit significant sites within London which illustrate aspects of the history of this great metropolis.

Aims and

Objectives:

The course aims to introduce students to the history of London from Roman times to today, through a study of important moments and events that shaped the history of the city throughout the centuries. The course is divided into themes in order to provide students with an understanding of the development of London by exploring social, cultural and political changes. The course is designed to be interactive, and students are expected to participate in all the field trips to the relevant locations within London.

- Analyze primary and secondary materials in order to achieve a critical understanding of different moments in the history of London in their political, social and cultural contexts.
- Present research orally in a convincing and accessible manner.
- Complete assigned work with a degree of clarity, technical competence and critical thinking, and a degree of independence and capacity for self-evaluation, appropriate for a 5000-level course

Indicative Content:

- Historiography and narratives of the history of London
- Cultural, social and political moments in the history of London from the Romans to today
- Cultural, social and political aspects of urban landscape development through the centuries.
- Spatial and imagined sites in the history of London

Teaching Methodology:

The course will be taught through a combination of lectures and seminar classes. Lectures are primarily designed to give an overview of the issues and problems on a particular topic, and thereby provide guidance for seminar discussion. Seminars will be used for debates and are intended to provide an interactive and participatory learning environment. The general approach to classes is informal, and discussion is viewed as an essential part of learning. Where possible the course will make use of museums, collections and sites in London. These external trips serve as a basis for the projects.
